JOY or HAPPINESS?



hat do you see in this woman's face? Joy? Happiness? Both? Webster's defines joy as "the emotion evoked by well-being, success, or good fortune or by the prospect of possessing what one desires." It also defines happiness as the

agreeable sensations which spring from the enjoyment of good; that state of a being in which desires are gratified. John Piper writes, "Christian joy is a good feeling in the soul, produced by the Holy Spirit, as he causes us to see the beauty of Christ in the word and in the world."

Recently I was reading some Mustard Seeds and came across one written by Jan Struck called 'From Quiet Times to Noisy Love,' where she wrote that many people, including Christians, believe that God wants us to be happy. But happiness is often confused with the joy we read of in Scripture. Being happy is a feeling of bliss or a mood that is dependent on other people and circumstances. Joy is a gift from the Holy Spirit, not a moment or a mood.

She continues by saying joy is God's intentional gift of His presence. Jesus came to live among us, speak the truth of God's unconditional love for us, and take away our sin through His death and resurrection. No matter what circumstances surround us, we can live in the joy that we are His precious children. We are made whole in the promise of Jesus, "that they may have my joy fulfilled in them" John 17:13b.

I am sure many of you have seen our Synod's theme of "Joy:fully Lutheran." The theme focuses on 1Thess. 5:16-24, where Paul says to "rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus." Paul ends by saying, "He who calls you is faithful; he will surely do it." Joyful, because God's love and faithfulness are kept in Jesus. Lutheran, because it's all about Jesus: Grace alone. Faith alone. Scripture alone. Christ alone.

So, how can someone know you have joy in your heart? Years ago, in Kyrgyzstan, people

approached Bob and me and told us that they knew we were Christians. When we asked how they knew, the answer was always, 'because you are always smiling!' (Yes, it happened more than once). But what an opener to share the joy in Jesus, joyful, because of God's love and promises.

I pray that you can share His JOY in

everything you say and do even if you just smile. I am privileged to have been asked to lead early

hat was the theme of the 38th Biennial Convention at Mobile! What a great time we had as 3,105 women and a few men gathered to sing praises led by the Rev. Dr. Dien Ashlev Taylor of Redeemer Lutheran Church in the Bronx. He was amazing BECKY HALTAUFDERHEID as he had people on their feet singing and dancing in the aisles.

We listened to Bible study leaders Friday and Saturday mornings to start our day. I

attended Karol Selle's Bible study about Missionary Joanna Johnson's mission work in Taiwan and how Joanna reflected on her calling and comparing it to Balaam's donkey. She was called to a place of weakness, humility and struggle to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with others.



Bible study leader, Donna Pyle inspired us with her theme, "Tell the Story of His Glory."




She began the Bible study with the history of King David and the movement of the Ark of the Covenant back to Jerusalem. based on 1 Chronicles. She compared the leadership of King David who worked as a team, to the ladies of the LWML

working together as a team. She concluded her Bible study with the message that God doesn't need us, but wants us to be the feet and hands of Jesus. He extends His mercy to us every time we study His Word, and we need to share His



Word with reverence! Jan Struck entertained us as the humorous interrupter. Gloria May. She shared her phone

conversations with her friend. Marvalee about mission projects, getting others involved in service events and beginning a choir, "Sing, Alleluia Southern Senior Youth" choir. She regretted the name after Marvalee pointed out the initials were S.A.S.S.Y. and they would not look good on a shirt highlighted in glitter. She concluded by changing her name to Gloria Will as she planned to get busy with mission projects and getting others involved.



Mites in Action speakers were inspiring to see how LWML grants have helped in many locations. Jean Jaskierny shared how a \$25,000 grant built a sewing center in Tanzania and changed the lives of many in a small African village. Stephanie Schulte spoke about the Mercy Medical Team she traveled with in Sierra Leone in 2018. She shared how two grants for a total of \$125,000 were used to bring medical supplies, healing and the love of Jesus to so many in the villages of this country. Laura Hemminger, Director of Y4Life shared how a \$25,000 grant was used to proclaim to others that God gives value to all life - from the womb to the tomb. Lynn Corker, from Women of the Pearl in Uganda shared how a \$100,000 grant was utilized to help empower women by educating them in literacy, government, agriculture, and personal hygiene. Lynn said these women are learning about Jesus and take what they've learned back to their villages. They learn how to make soap, sell it and tithe their earnings. This grant also helped to build a

seminary and next year 24 young men will graduate and the number of pastors serving will double. Rev. Gregory Manning shared how a grant of \$100,000 to NOLA4H helped many homeless, hungry and hurting people in New

As you read in Lynne Johnson's message, NWD LWML Board met in May and voted to pay Mission Grant number 5 to Mission Central for \$10,000. We thank and praise God for the missionaries He has chosen to serve around the world, all in Praise to the Lord!

Missions in Mobile

North Wisconsin District was represented by 18 delegates, three YWR's, one Heart to Heart Sister involved in Leadership training, Junior Counselor - Rev. Doug Reinders and NWD LCMS President - Rev. Dwayne Lueck and his wife Cheryl. Delegates adopted a \$2,100,000 Mission Grant goal for the 2019 - 2021 biennium. With the Lord beside us and with his grace and love, the LWML delegates pledged their support with prayers and mite offerings to fund 21 mission grants.

the singing for over 3,000 women's voices during the convention. The harmony of all those voices brought tears to my eyes. Missionary guest speakers reported on their work in the mission field and how the mission grant money from LWML was used to make a difference in people's lives in the US and around the world. I learned so much and I feel more motivated to work and give my mite offerings to LWML, especially after hearing how the recipients so carefully spend that money! I learned how each zone elects a delegate to the convention, and they in turn vote for the officers and the Mission Grant Goal and Mission Grants for the next biennium.

By the end of the trip there was such camaraderie on the bus and in Mobile. I now have "Sisters" around the country! I also have a better understanding of the mission work of






Concordia University, Selma. We were also able to take a walk across the bridge where Dr. Martin Luther King led people on his nonviolent Marches.


