Mission trip to Orphan Grain Train and Mission Central August 11-14, 2020

The North Wisconsin District LWML is planning a mission trip to Norfolk, Neb., and Mapleton, Iowa, next summer. We have also planned an extra opportunity to attend a Dinner Theater Thursday night, August 13, featuring "The Browns" family in La Mars, Iowa. (thebrownsmusic.com) We will be traveling with Lamers Bus Service and seats are limited to the first 50 people sending in a completed registration.

The total cost of the trip for each participant is \$449 for one per room, \$281 for two per room, \$228 for 3 per room and \$199 for 4 per room that includes 3 nights lodging, transportation and 5 meals. The cost of the Thursday night optional dinner theater is \$45.

Plans are to leave at 8 AM Tuesday from Wausau with stops along Hwy 29 and in Eau Claire. We will arrive in Norfolk Tuesday evening. Lunch and supper on the way is at your own expense.

Wednesday there will be a continental breakfast with hot items provided by the hotel. Following devotions, we will go to the Orphan Grain Train headquarters for a tour and a servant event.

Doug Trampe, from OGT, has requested attendees to collect items for Health and School Kits. A list of items is on the OGT website. (www.ogt.org)

Our mission at OGT will end at 5 PM Wednesday evening. The evening meal is at your own expense.

After breakfast and devotions on Thursday morning we will travel to Mapleton to tour Mission Central and spend time with missionaries Gary Thies and Brent Smith. Be prepared to be inspired by their amazing mission stories! Gary has asked that women bring along an extra pair of socks "because they will have their socks blown off their feet!" We will spend approximately four hours there and will be served lunch. Then we travel to our hotel in La Mars and attend the optional dinner theater.

The bus will return to the Wausau area Friday evening, Aug 14.

im Young Eagle was born and raised in Wisconsin. He is a Native American of

Pawnee descent.



Throughout his career Tim has been a successful leader with a distinguished record of accomplishment in fundraising, sales, marketing and leadership that spanned for more than 40 years.

Prior to his calling as Executive Director of Lutheran Indian Ministries.

Tim served as the Senior Principal Gifts Officer for the Lutheran High School Association of Greater Milwaukee Foundation (LHSAGM Foundation), National Director of Development for Bethesda Lutheran Communities, Executive Vice President of Mission Advancement for the Lutheran High School Association of Greater Milwaukee and as LHSAGM's Interim CEO.

Tim earned his designation as a Certified Fund Raising Professional (CFRE) in 2014. He also holds a Certificate in Fund Raising

Leadership from Indiana University's Lilly School of Philanthropy. In addition to his work in fundraising, Tim is a professionally certified workshop facilitator for The Extreme Leadership Institute's LEAP program, The Leadership Challenge, The Student Leadership Challenge, and Team Emotional and Social Intelligence. He is the author of "The Dream Catcher – A Father and Son Story" a work of Christian fiction published by Author House in 2003. Tim received his Bachelor of Science degree in Education from the University of Wisconsin – Madison.

eacon Bob and Deon Prue along with their three children: Treson (7), Jorey (5) and



Marlee (3) serve at Haskell Light a campus ministry at Haskell Indian Nations University in Lawrence, Kansas. They are joined by a full-time volunteer, Bill Paris who moved from Dayton, Ohio to help.

Haskell is a government funded Indian school that enrolls

over 900 students each semester. They also serve the large native community (4,000+) in Lawrence. Bob, Deon and Bill stand in as many of the students' parents while they are away from home. They come from homes filled with physical and sexual abuse, addiction, neglect and broken families. Bob and Deon openly share their story and how God saved them, while offering Bible studies, men and women's groups, motherhood and fatherhood classes, trauma healing programs, and drum making classes. They are looking forward to sharing what God has done in many of the students' and native families' lives.

Luncheon C and Mission Speaker - Cynthia Khan & Joy Markus of POBLO



Cynthia Khan was born and raised in Pakistan. She lived in Saudi Arabia for ten years before immigrating to North America. From her personal experience, she has raised awareness about the people and issues involved.

She now resides in Michigan but travels extensively. She has lived and served within an unusually broad variety of settings in different countries. Her hands-on experience makes her workshops very interesting and impacts the attendees in a special way as she shares her real life stories to validate her point.

She has maintained her integrity and effectiveness though she had to cope with the relentless upheavals due to rapid change of locations; she has experienced a rich diversity of people around the world that helps her draw new ideas of outreach that profoundly shifts the audiences' world view of evangelism —the mission field right here; and the time is now!.

Cynthia serves the Lord by serving the community through human care services using different evangelism strategies. These services meet the needs of refugees and new immigrants from all over the world. Audiences find Cynthia's unique experiences and vast understanding of world religions and cultures very valuable at conventions, conferences and

many workshops she conducts nationally and internationally.



oy Markus gained a master's degree in Islamic Sharia law, going on to establish a high school department of Islamic religion. One day in class, a student asked a question about Allah that Joy could not answer. This caused her to search.

eventually doubting Islam. A fellow teacher, who was Christian, gave Joy a Bible to read, connecting her to a pastor who answered all her questions.

Joy was convinced of the truth but could not face the challenge of losing her career, her family, and a secure life in order to follow Christ. This is how Joy found herself living a double life, teaching Islam by day, and living a Christian life by night. Moved by a dream in which she saw a door labeled "Christianity" and a voice say, "Enter here-- this is the way, and the truth and the life," Joy believed and was baptized. Sharing her faith in Christ with family brought her threats of death. Miraculously, with God's help, POBLO received Joy as a missionary in training as she now shares Jesus' love with Muslim women in Metro Detroit and via the Internet.

Luncheon D and Keynote Speaker - Linda Reiser, Past President Lutheran Women's Missionary League


Linda Reiser was born and raised on a farm in Waterbury, Nebraska. She was confirmed at Trinity Lutheran Church, Martinsburg, Nebraska, where fall mission festivals began to spark her interest in the mission work of the church.

That mission interest was further realized years later as she served as the 15th President of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League from 2003-2007. As President of the LWML, Linda was able to witness firsthand the amazing "mighty Mite Box" donations from the women of the church. Those millions of dollars, as well as the prayers offered for the missions and missionaries, have made an eternal difference throughout the world. Linda was also able to attend a graduation ceremony in Bo, Sierra Leone, where men were being "set aside" for ministry in local congregations at the Center for Theological Studies that was started by an LWML grant 30 years ago.

Before her election as LWML President, Linda served as Vice President of Servant Resources, Leader Development Committee Chairman, and as Nebraska South LWML President. Linda presided over the 31st biennial convention in Tampa, Florida, under the theme *Live Joyfully as*

Salt and Light, and the 32nd biennial convention in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, where the LWML gathered to ROCK! Rest On Christ the King.
