When I first learned of Esther Karolus. I discovered she had been a pediatric nurse, that she loved children, loved the LWML and attending conventions, but most of all she loved the Lord. She had been a humble woman who praised Christ and what He had done for her and allowed Him to use her as an instrument to share that love with others. Esther passed away 20 years ago, but the love for the Lord that she passed down through the generations lives on today. At the time of her husband's death, Esther sat down with a gift planning counselor and an attorney. She wanted to be a wise steward of her resources and discovered that a charitable remainder unitrust could allow her children to receive income over a 20 year period and at the end of that time several charities could receive a sizable gift. The Esther Karolus Charitable Remainder Unitrust matured this year and our district was blessed to be a recipient. I am in awe of God's timing once again. With mite donations down approximately 45% due to the pandemic and its domino effect. there is concern the financial needs of our grant recipients will be in jeopardy. But let's not forget who is in charge. Reverend David Karolus, Peace Lutheran, Antigo, was influenced



by his mother's love for the Lord. "My mother was very active in our home congregation, Grace Lutheran in Augusta. She made sure each day began with devotions and she was always collecting mites in her mite box." His mission, Let the Little Children Come to Me, is growing, having more than doubled in size in the last six years. The Lutheran school started a childcare ministry as a way to reach out to the young families in the community who often are unaffiliated with a church. Now both childcare and school are out of room. A building expansion would provide rooms for infant care up to five-year-old kindergarten, before and after school care, a secure entrance, and a new administrative hub for the church, school, and childcare. Groundbreaking is set for Sunday, September 27. The Executive Board voted to



provide them with \$10,000 to help with this expansion project. "We are so thankful for the support of the LWML! My mother would be so pleased to see her gift being used to help children," commented Pastor Karolus.

Shelly Karolus, Director of Donor Relations for Camp Luther and the wife of Pastor Karolus, also fell under the influence of Esther. "Esther became one of my dearest friends and her love for Jesus showed in her daily life. Our conversations usually were about her grandchildren,



what was happening at our churches, what the LWML ladies were doing in the different zones, along with many words of encouragement to a tired mom with four busy children. She was definitely a bold speaker of God's

salvation for everyone." Her mission, *Furniture, Fixtures, and Equipment for Future Generations*, impacts more than 6,000 visitors to Camp Luther annually. The ministry has shared the gospel of Christ for over 73 years in a facility that was over 100 years old. As it could not meet the growing needs of the ministry, a new community center was built this past year to serve and uplift others through prayer,



fellowship, and equipping them to share the love of Christ through the generations. The Executive Board voted to pay this grant of \$20,000, selected by our delegates at convention, with \$10,000 coming from the unitrust and \$10,000 from our mite offerings.

Shelly shared one of her favorite memories. When Esther would greet her grandchildren with a hug, she'd say, "I love you so much but Jesus loves you even more!" Shelly comments, "What better legacy to leave behind, the knowledge of the love He has for you and the eternal life one receives from Jesus Christ as their Savior."

As I write this, tears of joy threaten to fall. I think of this humble woman and the lives she continues to impact. And I think of the Esthers in my life, the quiet women who live—or lived—a life devoted to God and shared that love with me. Who are the Esthers in your life?

A re you tired of COVID-19? Are you ready for everything to be back to normal? What will normal look like? How can we stay focused and fired up when most of our LWML functions have been canceled this past year?

"Blessed are those whose way is blameless, who walk in the law of the

LORD! Blessed are those who keep His testimonies, who seek Him with their whole heart, who also do no wrong, but walk in His ways!" Psalm 119:1-3.

Let me help you stay focused on the work of the LWML. First and foremost, we start out by being focused on God's Word every day and encourage each other to do the same. Perhaps you call LWML sisters and check in on them, have a devotion together, pray together or conduct a Bible study by FaceTime. With the use of technology, nothing can stop us from sharing God's Word and the love of Jesus with each other. Even though this pandemic is separating us from each other, it will never separate us from the love of Jesus, nor will it stop us from sharing the love of Jesus with others through our mite offerings. Every time you put a coin or dollar bill in your mite box, you are doing the mission work of the LWML. God is in control and He will guide us through this pandemic and beyond. You will be able to stay on course!

This fall, some of you are holding fall rallies and some have been canceled. Your zone president will need to conduct business that normally occurs at fall rallies. Each zone will be asked to select a delegate and two alternates to represent our district at the convention in Lexington. The delegate expenses are paid for by the district. Transportation reimbursement is \$300 based on the cost of the 6-day bus transportation. All delegate convention registration and meals are reimbursed. Housing in Lexington is reimbursed based on two

persons per room. The delegate and alternate information will need to be submitted to me by December 31.

Are you creative? Would you be willing to submit a banner design to represent North Wisconsin District in Lexington? The Executive Board will be choosing the banner

design at the February board meeting. You do not need to make the banner, just simply submit a design based on the theme of this convention, "Running the Race, Looking to Jesus." This banner design should be submitted by December 31 to be considered at the February board meeting.

Are you considering attending the convention in Lexington? Check out the bus information submitted by Sue Neider, Meeting Manager. If you have never attended a national convention, this is your opportunity to ride the bus to the convention. You will have so much fun on the bus ride to the convention and back. There are daily devotions, stories, new reports of activities on the bus, etc. You will never be bored riding a bus with LWMLers!

Lexington is the horse capital of the world! The convention will be held at the Rupp Arena and Convention Center located in downtown Lexington. I have heard Dina Vendetti will return as the music leader and Jan Struck will be returning as the humorist interrupter. These two together will be a class act of their own. You won't want to miss their interactions! More information on the convention will be released on the LWML website (www.lwml.org) in the near future.

October is LWML month and we remember LWML by celebrating with a special Sunday service. Normally it is the first Sunday in October, but you can celebrate LWML on any Sunday. This year's theme is "Kingdom People Produce Kingdom Fruit" written by Rev. Larry Krueger. Visit the

LWML website under the news link and you will be able to find most of the information you will need for your celebration service.

Please continue to send in your mite offerings. National Mite offerings are down 45% due to this pandemic and cancellations of many LWML conventions and events across the US in which mite offerings would have been gathered. However, I am pleased to announce that their September to Remember campaign brought in \$90,726.48, which is the highest ever raised on a Giving Tuesday. Praise God for our faithful donors. Our district mite offerings are going strong despite the cancellation of LWML rallies, two retreats, and our district convention. Thank you for being so faithful. With your generosity, we were able to pay half of the NWD Professional Church Workers Grant for \$12,500 and we paid \$10,000 to Camp Luther for the Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment for Future Generations.

This July, NWD LWML received a gift from the trust account of Esther Karolus. She was a mission-minded, faithful LWML member from Eau Claire. Through her gift-planning with the



LCMS Foundation, her unitrust time had expired and the remainder was distributed to her charities. At the September board meeting, it was approved to send \$10,000 to national mite offerings, \$10,000 to Peace

Lutheran Church in Antigo for their building expansion, where her son, Rev. Dave Karolus is Senior Pastor. Another \$10,000 was sent to Camp Luther to fulfill the remainder of the *Furniture, Fixtures, and Equipment for Future Generations*. This grant was submitted by Shelly Karolus, Esther's daughter-in-law. I'm sure Esther would be happy to know her gift was used for missions here and abroad. The remainder of her gift was placed in Gifts and Bequests to be used at a later date.

I am praying with you that COVID-19 is beginning to be controlled and we as a nation can get back to some sort of normalcy. I pray along with you for peace for this nation during this time of great racial unrest. May God move the hearts of many to see the love that Jesus offers, so that healing amongst people can begin and we see our fellow neighbors as children of our heavenly Father. May God continue to bless the work of the LWML in our district and beyond so that others may hear and know of the love of Jesus for them.

"Jesus said, 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes" (Matthew 21:42).

Have you ever attempted to build anything? Maybe a birdhouse with your child or grandchild? How about a gingerbread house around Christmas time? Maybe you've played the game Jenga, where

you have to pull one block of wood and restack it on top, hoping that things don't topple over. I have to admit, I'm not very handy at building things. I like to try at building things, but most of my efforts fall short and usually do not look at all like they should. And it by no means looks marvelous. Sadly, the same can be said about our faith as well, it does not always look like it should.

LWML Sunday is scheduled to take place in October at many churches, under the theme of, "Kingdom People Produce Kingdom Fruit." But how often has our faith produced fruit? St. Paul tells us, that the fruit of the Spirit is, "love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). However, the problem is when we examine our hearts and lives we find that we are more often than not producing rotting fruit, fruit that is spoiled by sin. Love is replaced by anger, joy is given over to bitterness, and peace replaced with malice. Don't just take my word for it, just review your own life in light of the feelings and things you have said or done over the last 6+ months with COVID and the response of those who wear or don't wear a mask. How have your thoughts and words betrayed the fruits you should be bearing when you said or thought things against those running for political office, or the social unrest we see in cities throughout the USA. Yes, our hearts and lives do not show enough that we are Kingdom people, bearing Kingdom fruit. Far to often, we are earthly people bearing fruits of self-righteousness. And the reason for

this is because we have been building on the wrong foundation. You & I have been trying to build upon our own good works, our own thoughts, and our own desires.

But your Lord Jesus has come to give you a new foundation, but first has to destroy your foundation. So He gives us His law that destroys any hint of thinking we can build on our own. God's law shows that our works-the fruit of our own doing-is rotting and worthless, which leads us to repentance – to seek a better way. And through Christ Jesus' words of forgiveness, He cultivates our hearts and minds. Preparing to give us a firm and solid foundation, built on the cornerstone of His life, death, and resurrection.

With the Gospel of Christ firmly planted in our hearts and minds, our lives begin to produce the fruits of faith. A faith that looks and acts differently than the world, because it is Kingdom fruit. Its fruit that shows love to those whom the world hates, joy to those who are in despair, and peace in the midst of such unrest. Its fruit that is borne first and foremost from the Cross of Christ. For there in the cross we see what true love is, and we learn of the joy we have in knowing that all our rotting sins have been forgiven, and we learn of the eternal peace we have with God. And all that is done in faith, done with Christ at the center, will accomplish what God desires, for He declares "my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it" (Isaiah 55:11). What a blessing it is to know that it does not depend upon our skills or talents to build the Kingdom of God.

So, don't worry if you aren't great at building things, or if you struggle to produce fruit, instead trust in the Lord, knowing that He can use your poor building skills to accomplish His saving will, and it will be "marvelous in our eyes!"

A leader? Me? No thanks! I'm really more of a follower than a leader. We often have doubts and fears about being in a leadership position. 

The banner was a method of announcing an official proclamation. Our banner proclaims that we are "Running the Race ... Looking to Jesus."

The LWML North Wisconsin District bus will depart for the 2021 LWML Convention on Tuesday, June 22, 2021, from Wausau and other pick up points spending Wednesday at the Creation Museum and Ark. If there is enough interest we can have another bus leave Wednesday, June 23, for those who would like a shorter trip.

We will leave convention when it adjourns about Sunday noon and return on Monday, June 28, with both buses with a stop in Louisville on the way north and an overnight in Indianapolis. Cost is expected to be approximately \$395 per person, depending on number of passengers (\$300 for the 6 days).

Join us for fun and fellowship as we travel by bus to the LWML 37th Convention-June 22-28,2021

We will leave aboard the Lamers Bus Lines motor coach from points in our North Wisconsin District on Tuesday, June 22 (June 23 for those who want to go directly to the convention) and return Monday, June 28. The Tuesday departure allows us to stop at the Creation Museum and Ark and a possible riverboat cruise on the Ohio River Wednesday night. All this on top of the fun we have just riding the bus. LWMLers are fun traveling companions. And you don't have to be a woman to come with us. Men are welcome. Ask the six men that came with us two years ago!

We are charging \$395 for the 7-day bus trip to and from Lexington, 2 nights in motels (with breakfast?), and the shuttle bus to and from the convention each day, based on 35 people per bus. If we have more people registered, we can maybe have money for meals also. The 6-day bus trip to Lexington on Wednesday would be \$300 that includes the bus and one night in a motel. - Have a once a month offering during the church service:
