

Check Your Luggage - Packing & Unpacking

S I write this article
Spring Break is right
around the corner and a lot of
people are preparing to take
vacations away with their
families. I will be traveling as
well. I will be going to Ohio to
spend a little time with my
mother, as she will be
undergoing knee surgery.
Not the way I pictured
planning Spring Break, but

definitely a good trip as I will get to see family.

Maybe you have plans to travel over Spring Break or during the summer months. But regardless of where one goes on vacation, one of the most essential things of any trip is the packing part. If you pack too much you could weigh down your car with unnecessary burdens or pay more for your luggage to fly cross country. If you don't pack the right things, if you pack a Parka for the beaches of Florida or a speedo for the slopes of Colorado, you just aren't going to be comfortable. So, it's best to check your luggage and make sure you are packing the right things and unpacking the unnecessary items.

But doesn't the same hold true for our lives and hearts as well? Think about it for a second. what are the things we often pack into our hearts and lives? Do we not fill our hearts with the cares and concerns of this world? How often do we try to pack our lives full of unnecessary things? We try and squeeze more time at work or on the sports field, or with family. We look to our bank accounts or status among co-workers and friends for value and meaning. Our hearts are often full of greed, anger, lust, and pride-among many other vices. It's all sin that has filled our hearts and lives. And packing our hearts and lives with such things lead to great burdens; burdens that hurt and destroy our relationship with God and one another. King David said, For my iniquities are gone over my head; As a heavy burden they weigh too much for me (Psalm 38:4). David knew a thing about having a heart packed with unnecessary things. His heart was full of lust,

as he sought out Bathsheba, it filled with murder as he had Uriah killed, and it filled with pride as he thought he got away with it all.

But our Lord Jesus warns against packing our hearts and lives with such things. Be on guard, so that your hearts will not be weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of life, and that day will not come on you suddenly like a trap (St. Luke 21:34).

So, as you prepare to go on a vacation, now is good a time as any to unpack your heart of all those burdens and sins that have filled your heart and life. King David reminds us, *Turn your burdens over to the LORD, and He will take care of you. He will never let the righteous person stumble* (Psalm 55:22). Unpack your heart by confessing to the Lord of all the things you have sought to fill your life with. The things that are as useless as a parka on a Miami Beach in the middle of the summer.

And as you unpack your heart, the Lord will pack your heart, mind, and soul with His blessings. As St. Paul says, Never worry about anything. Instead, in every situation let your petitions be made known to God through prayers and requests, with thanksgiving. Then God's peace, which goes far beyond anything we can imagine, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:6-7).

There in the cross of Christ all your burdens and sins have been unpacked from your hearts and life and placed on Jesus. Packed onto the cross where He would bear your burdens by His unpacking of His own life, giving Himself up to death. And then by His resurrection three days later, Jesus packs you full of His blessings of forgiveness, life, salvation, peace, hope, and comfort. Blessings packed into your heart at baptism, packed into your ears every time you gather around the Word of God, and packed into your mouth as He feeds you Himself.

So, make sure to check your luggage before going anywhere on vacation and unload the unnecessary and fill your bags with the essential. And then do the same with your heart and life, unburden your heart, soul, and mind and fill them instead with the vital gifts of God. Amen.

Washed

hands?" This was a question I was asked many times as I was growing up. My mother wanted me to be clean. Recently we have been told, "Wash your hands." This has been repeated by those who wanted to keep us healthy.

Washing is mentioned in the Bible many times. The

verse that comes to mind right away is Psalm 51:7 (NIV): Cleanse me with hyssop, and I will be clean; wash me, and I will be whiter than snow. This verse is a great comfort when we feel we need to be cleansed from our sin. God is there to wash us and make us clean. James 4:8 says, Come near to God and He will come near to you. Wash your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded. If you want God to come near to you, you must come near to God by being in His Word. Read God's Word daily!

Titus 3:4-5 (NIV) tells us: But when the kindness and love of God our Savior appeared, He saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of His mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit. Our sin keeps us from God, but through faith in Jesus, the penalty for sin is washed away.

Baptism is also noted as a way to wash away sins. Paul is told by Ananias in Acts 22:16 (NIV): And now what are you waiting for? Get up, be baptized and wash your sins away,

calling on His name. Our sins were washed away when we were baptized. The washing away of our sins at our baptism should come to mind when we confess our sins and ask for forgiveness.

Washing also brings to mind Jesus washing His disciples' feet as reported in John 13:3-5 (NIV): Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under His power, and that He had come from God and was returning to God; so He got up from the meal, took off His outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around His waist. After that, He poured water into a basin and began to wash His disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around Him. This act of humility and selfless service is an example for us. We, too, should be willing to serve wherever and whenever needed.

In 1 Corinthians 6, after Paul gives examples of how disobedience against God leads to being separated from him, he says, *That is what some of you were. But you were washed, you were sanctified, you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ* (1 Cor. 6:11). We are "washed," we are "sanctified," we are "justified," we are believers being forgiven in the "name of the Lord Jesus Christ."

God wants us to be washed, to be clean from sin, to be healthy, forgiven, and serving others. One more Bible verse to ponder:

1 John 1:7: But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin. Praise be to God!

During our 2020-2022 Biennium, we surpassed our biennium mission grant goal of \$110,000 by supporting mission grants in the amount of \$127,500. Hooray!

As we celebrate these events, it is my hope that you experience the joy of being united with your sisters in Christ through our joint service in the LWML NWD, "Serving the Lord with Gladness!"

Mission Grant Proposals 2022 - 2024 \$115,000 Goal



- Bringing Spanish Braille Bibles to Central & South America – \$10,000 Funds would be used to purchase resources and materials to produce 2,000 volumes of Spanish braille Bibles for free distribution, primarily to Bible Societies in Central and South America over the next two years.
- North Wisconsin Professional Church Workers Student Grants – \$25,000 Funds would provide financial aid for NWD students attending synodical universities and planning to enter full-time church work.
- Orphan Grain Train WI Branch \$15,000 Funds would be used to assist with the cost of shipping relief food and/or supplies to those in need around the world and in the United States.
- Ministry Catalyst for International Student Ministry, Inc. – \$25,000 Funds would be used to support the ISM Inc. Ministry Catalyst position for LCMS international ministries.
- Developing Servant Leaders for Future Generations – \$20,000 Funds would be used to equip the lower level of the Community Center/Dining Hall at Camp Luther with technology, equipment, and furnishings.
- Wisconsin Valley Lutheran High School, Mosinee, Wis. - Tuition Assistance – \$5,000 Funds would be used for tuition assistance for students who find affording tuition is an obstacle.
- 7. Shepherding the Sheep
 Congressional Team Grant \$10,000
 Funds would be used by MOST Ministries to partially finance two congressional teams within our District to share the Good News and Jesus' love through acts of mercy.
- Gospel Focused Life Skills Programs in Interior Alaska – \$5,000 Funds would be used to aid in the development and

- implementation of this Christ-centered program that addresses underlying issues to empower individuals through grace.
- 9. "God Speaks in Our Language!" Lutheran Books for North Wisconsin Immigrants & Campus Ministries – \$8,500 Funds would be used to enable the Lutheran Heritage Foundation to provide Lutheran books for churches and campus ministries to share the Gospel here in Wisconsin and around the world.
- 10. Kruse Memorial Chapel Transformation – \$4,000 Funds would be used for upgrades to the Memorial Chapel on the Minot Campus of Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch to make a more engaging and inviting space.
- 11. Bibles for Cancer Patients \$11,000

 Funds would be used to purchase large print
 Bibles that are dispersed to individuals
 fighting cancer in the United States.
- 12. Labor of Love \$20,000 Funds would be used to sustain and increase the Labor of Love Fund to assist rostered workers in North Wisconsin with their financial obligations due to church worker's debt.
- 13. The Hannah Center, Inc. \$10,000

 Funds would be used to further programming that supports women in crisis so their lives and their children's can be restored to the glory of God.
- **14. Concordia Theological Seminary Food & Clothing Co-op \$10,000** Funds
 would help feed many LCMS seminarians
 and their families.
- 15. Worker Wellness for Chaplain
 Families \$3,000 Funds would be used by the Ministry to the Armed Forces for the unique challenges of military chaplaincy families and cover expenses to attend Wellness Retreats.

n Friday evening you will be treated to a presentation by Marin Webster Denning of the Oneida Nation Arts Program. He was born on the Menominee Reservation and is enrolled in the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin. He served as the Executive Director

of Southeastern Oneida Tribal Services. He is nationally recognized as a leading educator, lecturer and curriculum specialist in American Indian history and culture. Denning served on the Board of Directors at Milwaukee's Indian Community School, as an advisor on the Gates Millennium Educational Foundation and as a board member of Indian Summer Festival. He is a lecturer at the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee in the School of Education and serves as a consultant and trainer with Boeing

Corporation.

Denning is the 2019 inductee to the Wisconsin Pow Wow Hall of Fame through the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh. He is a men's traditional dancer, pow wow emcee, gifted public speaker and knowledge keeper of Native American traditional ways. He will educate and entertain us as he explains the art of Native American dance. Many have heard of pow wows, but don't understand the various dance styles or protocols. He will explain traditional dance regalia piece by piece and describe the meaning behind the designs. He will encourage conversations with the audience as an integral part of the program. At the end, you will not only know more about Native dance, but also have an opportunity to demonstrate what you have learned! This is a fun, fast-moving program that is perfect for all ages!


