New Year's Resolutions

Every year thousands of people make a New Year's resolution, maybe you are one of those people. There are resolutions that are focused on self-improvement such as dieting, to quit smoking, or to exercise more. Gym memberships in January often go up with 80% of those members quitting within the first five months.

Maybe the focus of your resolution is on being in a better place financially, so you decide to save money and to pay off debt. But then life happens, or we live outside of our means. Whatever your resolution is, if you made one, how are you doing at keeping it?

I used to try and make resolutions, and while I would start off strong, sooner or later, I would stumble and fail. And that failure would often lead me into feeling defeated and deflated and I would give up on my resolution. I don't tend to make them for that reason anymore.

But why even make resolutions to begin with? Well typically because we know we have an area of our life that needs focus or improvement. An area of our life that could use some TLC, that we could and should just do better in whether it be our finances, our health, our attitude, or whatever we are focused on.

But does Scripture have anything to say about making resolutions? And what exactly is a "resolution"? The dictionary defines resolution as "*a firm decision to do or not to do something.*" Resolution connotes intention, determination, aspiration. It is an

act of will. It is also based on a moral or personal belief. We can't enact our will behind something we don't believe matters. We resolve to eat better because we believe that it is good for us. The same with joining a gym or hiring a personal trainer.

God's Holy Word, the Bible, certainly encourages us to examine our lives and resolve to change them if necessary, and not just at the beginning of a new year. The Psalmist, for example, made a resolution to keep his speech pure: "*I have planned no evil; my mouth has not transgressed*" Psalm 17:3.

But why do so many of our resolutions fail? Sometimes it's simply because they aren't realistic. Instead, they're only wishful thinking, with no way to make them actually happen. For example, you might resolve to make a million dollars this year, but if you don't have any way to earn it, it probably isn't going to happen. Other resolutions fail because we aren't willing to make the sacrifices necessary to reach them.

But the real problem is within ourselves — within our own hearts and minds. We'd all like to be better people, but no matter how hard we try, we find ourselves tripped up by our own moral failures and weaknesses. Even St. Paul experienced this, *For I know that nothing good dwells in me, that is, in my flesh. For I have the desire to do what is right, but not the ability to carry it out. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing* Romans 7:18-19.

So, what is our solution? Where do we or should we begin? Well, St. Paul would direct us to not looking within ourselves, but to look outward away from ourselves. For us

to be successful in any aspect we need to focus first and foremost on Christ our Lord. Begin by confessing to God our Father, all our shortcomings, all our faults. Join King David in crying out, *Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me* Psalm 51:10. Return to your baptism and remember whom the Lord has called you to be, His child, forgiven and redeemed. And then live in your baptismal identity, living as His child knowing that you *can do all things through [Christ] who strengthens [you]* Philippians 4:13.

And when you stumble upon or even if you fail miserably at your resolutions. Look to the cross and see the one who succeeded for you, whose life, death, and resurrection is credited to you. Whose blood resolves all our failures, all our sins, and who make us better and holier than any resolution we can imagine. Better yet, instead of making up



any resolutions of our own and failing, maybe this year we should just all resolve to live under the Cross of Christ. For as the Psalmist reminds us, *He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will abide in the shadow of the Almighty* Psalm 91:1. And in His presence you will not fail.

FAQ (Frequently Asked Questions) Milwaukee LWML Convention June 22-25, 2023

Q: Where can I obtain information about the convention?

A: Complete convention information is available in the 2022 winter issue of the Lutheran Woman's Quarterly (LWQ) and on the LWML website: www.lwml.org/2023-conventions. Issues of LWML eNews will also contain convention information. If you do not currently receive eNews, you may subscribe at www.lwml.org/stayintouch for this free virtual publication.

Q: Where in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, will the convention be held?

A: The convention venue site is the Wisconsin Center located at 400 W. Wisconsin Avenue, Milwaukee, WI 53203.

Q: Is the Wisconsin Center handicapped accessible?

A: The Wisconsin Center is ADA capable with elevators on all floors.

Q: How can I register for convention?

A: Convention registration will be done completely online. Information and guidance for how to register is in the 2022 winter issue of the LWQ.

Q: When does convention registration open?

A: Early discounted registration at \$160 is 1/9/2023–3/14/23; Regular registration for \$180 is 3/15/23–5/10/23; Late registration of \$205 is 5/11/23–6/10/23. After June 10, 2023, registrations will be taken at the convention and no meals may be ordered.

Q: What is the cancellation policy for the convention?

A: Cancellation and refund dates are June 10, 2023. Cancellations must be in writing, postmarked, emailed, or faxed, and signed by the registrant. A \$45 processing fee will be retained. There will be no refunds after June 10, 2023.

Q: What is included in the registration fee?

A: The registration fee includes admission to all convention sessions, evening programs, and exhibit hall.
